






Estrellas Jovenes (Young Stars) is an extracurricular, after school program that supports students from local public schools by introducing them to innovative learning.

SPORTS FOR LIFE (DPV)



With support from the Peace Corps, DPV has grown to over 250 trained facilitators nationwide and over 1400 youth participating in courses yearly.



COMPUTER LITERACY

The DREAM Music Program is based on the simple belief that early childhood development and at risk youth are inspired to improve their education through music. Located in the DREAM Center. this program exposes impoverished youth, ages 3 to 18, to a structured music program that coincides with their focus on quality education.

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PUBLIC & MOBILE LIBRARIES

The Dominican Republic suffers from dismal functional literacy rates and a severe lack of public libraries. In fact, The DREAM public library and mobile library system is one of the only resources of its kind in the entire north coast of the country. The success of these programs will dictate future investment in literacy and have a huge impact on how children prioritize literacy and the joy of reading.

BIRTH CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

Without birth certificates, students cannot attend high school in the Dominican Republic and young adults cannot apply for the identity card (cedula) needed to work. DREAM works on this issue in all of our sites by training Documentation Promoters to work directly in their communities. We are currently assisting over 100 community members.

The DREAM Computer Literacy Program introduces children to information technology through top of the line computer labs and instruction, using digital resources and teaching skill sets needed to join the modern work force.





TEACHER TRAINING

The goals of the Teacher Training Program are to ensure sustainable professional development for Cabarete public school teachers and to create an assessment system that captures students' academic growth, which can be used to inform and improve public school instruction.

As DREAM grows and continues to educate more and more youth, we become more of a movement each day. All of these DREAMers share one thing; the inspiring belief that all children deserve a quality education and that ultimately, that resource is the only thing that will lift them out of the cycle of poverty.
